The Best Number To Write On A Valentine

As is obvious by its below representation in a heart, the answer is obviously 3. Before I delve into the wonderful world of 3, I would like to apologize for an error. Due to a mistake with the handling of zero, the featured number in the Halloween edition should have been 9, and shall be treated as such for future reference. Tidbits regarding it will be included in this article because it is 3's square.

3 is a factor of 9, which is the decrement of 10. Therefore, 3-divisibility may be determined by a digit sum in base 10, as well as in hexadecimal ($16-1=3*5$). 9 is the only value c for which $c = a^b = b^a + 1$ has an integral solution. The sum of the last two digits of the first $4n$ powers of 3 is 200, the sum of whose prime factors allowing repetition is 16, whose prime factor sum is 8, which leads to 6, which leads to 5, 5 being the number of terms in the sequence prior to identity in the recursion. It is the first Fermat prime (of the form $2^{2^n} + 1$) and is also the first Mersenne prime (of the form $2^n - 1$). The number-letter conversion of HEART when shifted by 3 yields {13, 8, 4, 21, 23}. The product of the non-zero digits of 13842123's prime factors is 18144, while {18, 1+4, 4} is the numerical representation, shifted by 3, of RED: the perfect color for a heart.

$$\text{Tanoff} = 67$$

$$\text{Houtrouw} = 47$$

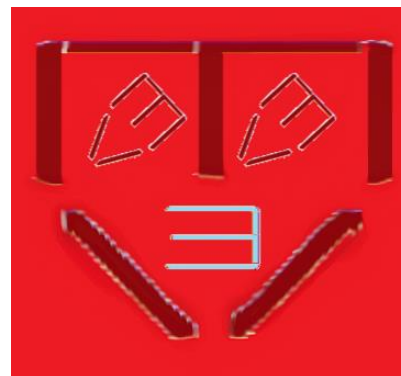
Therefore...

$$\left[\left(\frac{\text{Tanoff}}{\text{Houtrouw}} \right)^3 \right] = \text{KAMSC}$$

Method:

84 9th and 10th graders were asked for a random number 0-99 inclusive. For each digit, the option 0-9 with lowest variance in the other digit divided by the number of occurrences was chosen as the representative digit in the final result, in this case, 03. Teacher numbers were not included in the main data set.

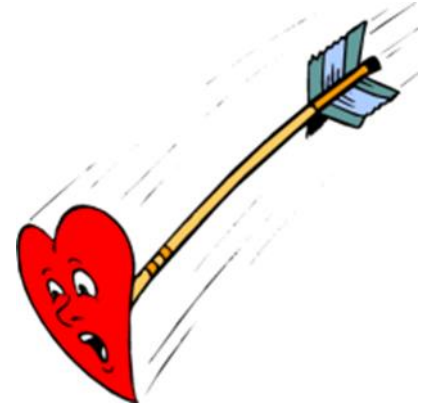
KAMSC-Worthy Pick-Up Lines

My heart is a method, and it was void until I saw you. You surpassed my expected parameter and now I can never return you.



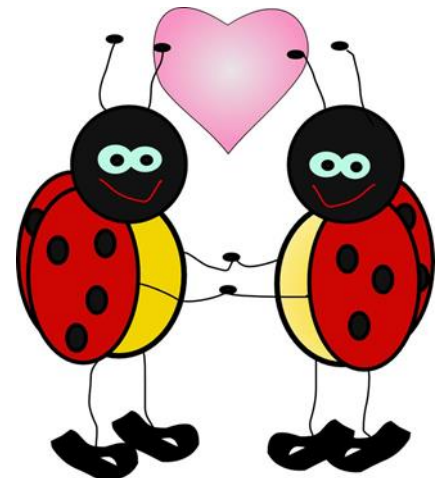
